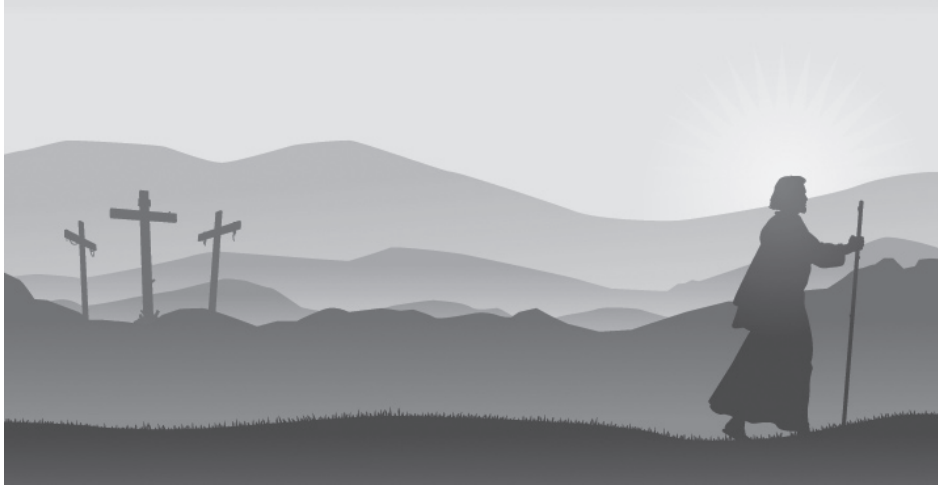

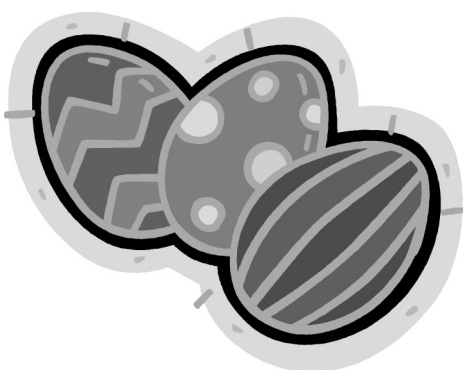

All Saints' annual Easter Egg Hunt will be from 10 a.m. to noon Saturday, April 11. Children will hunt eggs according to age.



Council OKs Healing Team proposal

During its regular meeting March 9, Congregation Council approved a recommendation of the Healing Team to contract with Ambassadors of Reconciliation for training and consultation.

The weekend program will include:

- A "Blessed are the Peacemakers" full-day seminar, which all members are encouraged to attend.
- Ambassadors meet with the pastors.
- Ambassadors attend Sunday worship.
- Ambassadors meet with Congregation Council, staff and the healing team.
- Ambassadors make an oral report to leadership.



The team of ambassadors will follow up the visit with a report and long- and short-term recommendations within 15 days.

The estimated cost of the program is \$5,000 to \$6,000, including child care and a luncheon. The cost was a concern to some council members but is much less than the proposed interim pastor who

would take on this task, said council member Connie Pierce.

Bringing in a neutral agency trained in peacemaking adds perspective, said Tally Whitehead, a member of the Healing Team. "Sometimes, it's best to bring in outside help," she said. She also emphasized that the value went well beyond any current conflicts. "It isn't just about the church. This can be applied to relationships with families and friends."

Council sent the plan to the Support Committee. If general funds are not available, the church will use monies from the Hildreth Fund, intended to improve the growth and health of the church.

Program to help health, hungry

Running out of excuses for being out of shape? Here goes another: All Saints is forming a running and walking group that will improve your health and raise money for Lutheran Social Services Food Pantries.

Who can join: Anyone and everyone. Age does not matter, current physical condition does not matter, and it does not matter if you want to train for a full marathon (26.2 miles) or simply walk a 5k (3.1 miles) to "get in better shape to keep up with the kids/grand-kids."

Our first race will be Oct. 18, when we plan to participate in the Columbus Full & 1/2 Marathon. Training will begin 16 weeks prior on June 20.

But don't let the word "marathon" intimidate you. The group is also looking at "fun" runs (5k or 10k distances) and other causes to take

on in the winter/spring training period. Know of a good one? Let us know, and we might be able to put it on our calendar.

We also are looking for All Saints members who would be willing to donate one night to host informational sessions for the group. Are you a nutritionist who can explain why it is important to "carb load" before a long run, or a physical therapist who can explain proper stretching techniques? Then we would love to hear from you.

Do you work for or own a company that could benefit from cheap advertising? We are also looking for corporate sponsors.

Easter to reconcile us to God, each other

"From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

2 Corinthians 5:16-21

What does Easter mean to you?

An empty cross, colored eggs, chocolate, resurrection, an Easter Bunny, spring, a new outfit, choco-



late, baskets filled with candy, church, flowers, (did I mention chocolate?), celebration, marshmallow Peeps, family, trumpets, fake grass, reconciliation ... reconciliation?

Central to Easter is reconciliation, the resumption of a healthy relationship, between God and human beings. Paul urges the Corinthians to be reconciled to God through Jesus and then to share the ministry of reconciliation with others.

Reconciliation is the restoration of a relationship that once was broken by sin. Because Jesus took on our sin, died on a cross and was raised from the dead, we can have a restored,

reconciled relationship with God. When our relationship to God is reconciled, we should want to be reconciled to others.

Reconciliation brings peace. Relationships need to be healed, and we need to forgive. But this isn't a process that we carry out on our own. God intercedes for us and participates with us to help us fulfill His will. Having been restored to a right relationship with God through Jesus, we can, with the help of the Holy Spirit, be reconciled to each other.

This is a vital part of the message Jesus Christ preached to the people he came in contact with and the message he sent disciples into the world to share. It is as timeless now as it was then. We need reconciliation.

We can be thankful that God allows us not only to experience it, but also to share it with others as God guides us to be reconciled and restored Easter people.

Fresh look, accessibility goals for newsletter

All Saints is happy to introduce this makeover of our monthly newsletter, "Saints Alive!" We hope that the electronic distribution and new look will make the publication more accessible to our church community.

While the decision to shift from a paper newsletter mailed via the U.S. Postal Service to an electronic format was based partly on economics, we saw this as an opportunity rather than an obstacle. Therefore, in reformatting the newsletter, we incorporated more color, a more reader-friendly design and more features.

We recognize that not all of our members and friends will have access to this electronic version of the newsletter, and we will have a limited number of printed newsletters on hand at the church. Because

of printing schedules, these will be available about a week after the electronic version is sent. We hope that those who can choose to read the newsletter in its electronic format. Accommodation for shut-ins or others unable to receive the newsletter in these ways will be arranged by request.

While All Saints recognizes the importance of sharing with the community through our monthly newsletters, the printing and postage costs have become prohibitive, a problem sure to worsen as the Postal Service is again increasing its rates.

By moving toward an electronic distribution method, All Saints anticipates saving at least \$5,000 in 2009, a significant amount in a difficult economy. This money can then be distributed to preserve our many ministries.

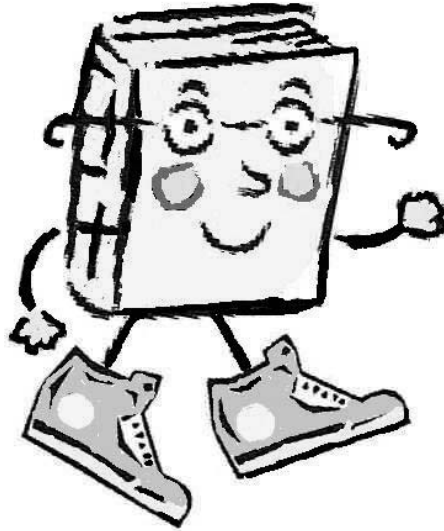

Pastor Gerber to participate in prison ministry

Pastor Bonnie Gerber will serve on a Kairos Prison Ministry Team April 23 through 26 at the Ohio Reformatory for Women in Marysville.

The Kairos Prison Ministry Web site describes it: "Kairos is a Christian, lay-led, ecumenical, volunteer international prison ministry, in which men and women volunteers bring Christ's love and forgiveness to incarcerated individuals and to their families. Kairos volunteers go into prisons in teams of 30 to 40 to pray, share the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ, share meals, and fellowship with the incarcerated on a one-to-one basis."

"I was in prison and you came to visit me."

For the ministry to be a success, Kairos and Pastor Gerber rely on your help. Here are ways in which you can participate in the program:

- Bake cookies: Pastor Gerber needs 175 dozen cookies by Wednesday, April 15.
- Pray: Sign up for the prayer vigil and pray for the

inmates and volunteers.

- Write letters: The team gives each woman a letter from the people praying for her. In all, we will need 42 letters.
- Give money: Each weekend costs \$5,000 (\$125 per inmate attending) to sponsor. We rely on God's people to help defray costs.

Specific directions for each task are available at the Kairos Prison Ministry table. Please stop by to see how you can help.

Fear must not keep us from call to witness

The first and last invitations and commands of Jesus were the same.

His first call to the disciples was to be fishers of men, women and children. As he ascended, Jesus commissioned his followers to go make disciples, baptize and teach, followed with the promise to be with them always. Never forget that promise.

So what gets in my way? What gets in my way of talking about Christ or church to people I know, such as, friends, relatives, neighbors and fellow workers?

When it comes to witnessing, there are fears that take over.

We might be afraid that we will offend the other person. There might be fear of being ridiculed. Some are fearful that they will appear stupid. Some

fear that they will appear hypocritical. Some folks are just shy. We know that Jesus asks us to spread the joy around. How do we overcome our fears?

It is not easy. It takes some doing even for an extrovert like me. It helps to have encouragement from other Christians. Prayer is vital. Like any other skill it takes practice.

The Welcome/Witness Committee is putting together a program to help us. Keep an eye out for the fall class "Witnesses for Christ." In these 10 sessions, we will explore the scriptures, encourage one another and have a safe environment to practice sharing God's story. One of the lessons is "Overcoming My Fears."

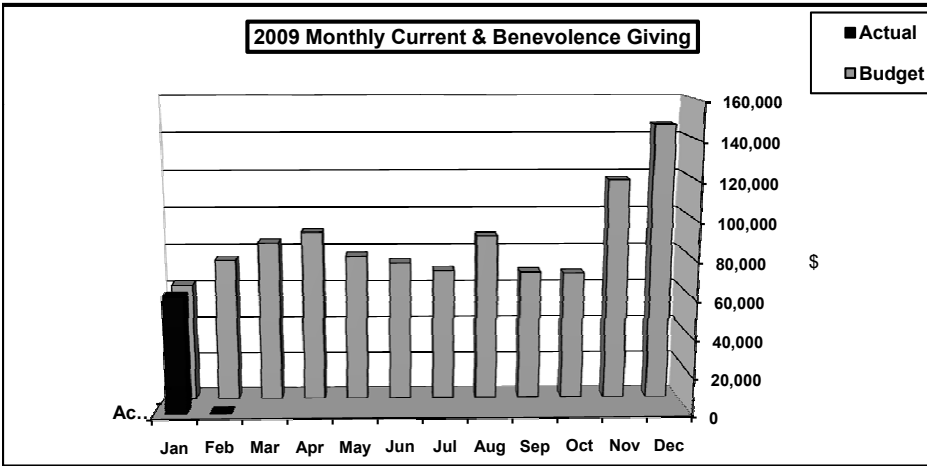
All Saints generous to Afghani children

Charter member has deep roots in region, church

In his 73 years, John Schuette has worn many hats: husband, father, successful businessman and Liberty Township trustee. He has consulted on projects all over the world, served on a federal government commission and testified before Congress for the Land Improvement Contractors of America.

But the hat that he wears most proudly is that of founder and charter member of All Saints Lutheran Church.

Early life

John was born in a log cabin on Nov. 22, 1935 to parents Walter and Garnet Schuette. In 1870, his maternal great-grandfather bought land and developed a large farm that stretched along the Scioto River from north of Seldom Seen Road to Powell Road. At the death of this great-grandfather, the farm was divided among four sons and four daughters.

John's grandfather inherited the north section and built his farmhouse at the corner of Seldom Seen Road and Riverside Drive. John's dad, a "city boy" and engineer, met his mother when he came to the house looking for a place to store his canoes. John's parents married and built the log cabin where John was born in the woods east of the house. They had five children.

John's father died two months before his 99th birthday.

"To his dying day, he was mean as a snake!" John said. He beat John's mother and the kids. Of John's 13 major surgeries, nine were related to back problems caused by being forced to lift and move heavy logs and equipment in his youth. Four of the kids left

home as soon as they could, at ages 16 or 17. In his senior year of high school at Hyatt's Vocational Agriculture program, John managed a Hereford farm near the school. From his father, John said, he learned how not to behave.

All Saints' member Dean Miller is a longtime friend. They met in first grade in Powell. John was grateful when Dean's dad was elected to the school board because the school then got inside toilets! Classmates named the duo Mutt and Jeff, and Dean still refers to John as his "itty-bitty buddy."

Work and hobbies

John worked for a farm machinery dealer in Plain City after high school and eventually bought a used bulldozer from a teacher in the vocational agricultural program. He used it in the summer and worked at the machine shop in the winter. Eventually, he began earth moving full time and kept at it for 45 years. For half of that time, he took agricultural engineering courses at The Ohio State University. "Taught a few too. I graduated with high marks from the school of hard knocks," John said.

Although his work and fam-

ily didn't leave much leisure time, John has enjoyed hunting around Central Ohio and fishing from his boat on Lake Erie. He is one of two cofounders of the Lake Hill Hunt Club near Ostrander. He also has trained bird dogs and says that after spending 30 minutes with a dog, he can tell what kind of people the owners are. And, here's a surprise: John has also written a bit of poetry!

Meeting Betty

Betty Schuette is John's second wife. His first wife and he had six children, five boys and a girl. And then she left, and he became both mother and father to the kids who ranged in age from five to 16. It was a difficult two and a half years, trying to handle the home and earn a living. He met Betty when his father-in-law was sharing a hospital room with a young man who was dying of cancer. Betty, a kindergarten teacher and mother of a new baby, was very loving as she cared for her husband.

When his situation changed, John called Betty to ask her out. She refused. Every few months over a two-year period, he'd call again. She eventually said yes.

They have been married for 35 years, live in the house John built 50 years ago, and have 11 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. John says Betty is a loving wife, mother and grandmother and every time they've had an argument, they end up laughing.

Faith

John has a strong faith. He has prayed, "Lord, I can't handle this by myself. You're gonna have to help me." And after that, "It all

turns around." He is also convinced that, "The Lord sent it even if the Devil brought it!" And, "If it hadn't been for my faith, I'd probably be dead by my own hand or in a mental institution. My Lord and Savior answers me. My faith is part of my life. I'll witness to anybody." John also notes that one of his biggest blessings is Betty.

'I will serve'

John was one of seven people who started All Saints. "The only one who has been at All Saints longer than me is God!" It happened this way: John and his wife and children had been attending Upper Arlington Lutheran, and one day he called the synod office to ask if there were any plans for a church farther north. He was told the synod was considering Worthington. In August 1961, Pastor Robert Ensign knocked on John's door and said he was putting together a steering committee for the new church. John responded: "I will serve."

All Saints started meeting at the Masonic Lodge in Worthington. They provided worship services and Sunday School. He and his first wife sang in the choir; charter member Jean Blosser played the organ. Eventually the Board of Missions found land on North High Street and paid \$40,000 for four acres with an option on two additional lots. "Some people had a fit about the cost," John said.

It was the site of the former Duprey Nursery, and it had a farm house, an outhouse and a two-story barn. An older man named Carl Clinger rented the farm house, and John, a Church Council member and the Property Committee chair, visited him once a month to collect the rent. Carl

liked the company and also liked to talk. John says it took about four hours to collect the \$28 rent. John mowed the All Saints property for six years and plowed snow from the parking lot for 36 years at no charge!

The first service in the new church was on Thanksgiving. John clearly remembers two things. One mother washed her girls' dresses with new fiberglass curtains and the girls nearly scratched themselves to death during the service and his own son got his thumb stuck in the door hinge!

Buildings, steeples and art

The first building (now the nursery) had a steep roof, but some people wanted a steeple, so one was built "on stilts" out front. During an expansion project, the steeple had to be torn down. John saved the copper roof from going to the dump and stored it for several years. He later reminded Pastor David Ullery about it, and the copper was given to Bob DeLay who used it to create the flames sculpture that hangs above the narthex desk.

John and Betty have been very supportive of All Saints youth. For 26 years, they sponsored annual trips to Cedar Point or King's Island for the teens in the Singing Saints. One year they took 28 kids on a rented bus and brought back 27. That young man probably learned a lesson about being on time from that point forward!

Congregational jester

John is known as the "congregational jester". "I made a covenant with the Lord 35 years ago that every day I'd make someone laugh," John said.

Each Sunday, he goes to the pew where a group of women sits and tells them a church-appropriate joke. The four regulars that John has designated as the "chorus line" are Dottie Rott, Marion Andrews, Marcie Edgell and Louise Grant.

John says, "If I don't stop there, they come down and get me!" He also sends more than 100 Happy Groundhog Day cards each year. His humor also extends to his equipment. The 420 pound anvil outside his workshop is named Bigfoot and the combination lawn mower/snowplow is named Lazarus because he brought it back from the dead.

When asked what he would most like to be remembered for, John responded, "A man who stood on his principles with unquestionable integrity."

John Schuette has much to be proud of. He is a credit to his family, his church and his God.
