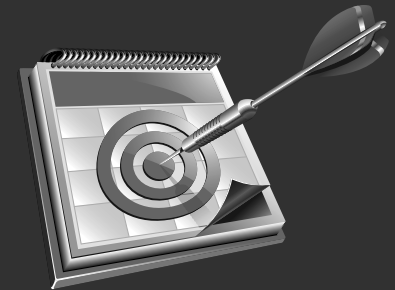

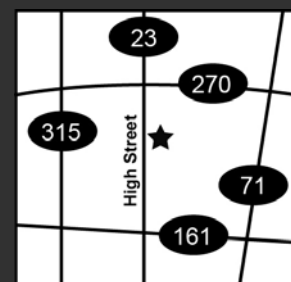

Missionaries to Africa receive \$1,000

During its regular June business meeting, Congregation Council voted to authorize \$1,000 to be sent to Hands on Africa in support of Phil and Erin (Quist) Vestal, who will begin work as missionaries for that organization in July.

Hands on Africa will start a Christian school in Malawi for children on a 1,000-acre farm near the village of Namwera. Currently, Hands on Africa runs an orphanage, a seminary and a health clinic on the farm.

Once they arrive in July, Erin will work in the school and with the local women, and Phil will work with local pastors.

Council Vice President Nick Britt suggested in May that the church provide the \$1,000 of the \$18,000 the couple needs to fund the trip to show support to Erin, a daughter of the congregation.

In other business, Council:

- Officially approved the Ministry Site Profile and lead pastor job



description submitted by the Call Committee for a designated lead pastor.

- Discussed a proposal to review the church's technology needs for the coming years. They referred a request to spend no more than \$850 to contract with Square One Technology Solutions of Columbus to review those needs and make proposals for improvements. Council will review any proposals and determine how the church should best move forward.
- Discussed ongoing efforts to find appropriate candidates for the position of executive director of administration, as

Marj Stevenson plans to retire Jan. 31. Personnel Committee member Amy Chapman, Pastor Bonnie Gerber and Council member Tim Huter are overseeing the search.

- Reviewed the need to fill the position of facilities' manager by Jan. 1. Director of Administration Marj Stevenson currently fulfills these responsibilities but will retire Jan. 31.
- Regretfully accepted the resignation of Bell Choir Director Becky Trefz, who ended her duties at the end of the current choir year. Members deferred discussion of a replacement until September, when the church's financial situation is more certain.
- Accepted the resignation of custodian Diane Ciconne, who had hoped to leave after her recent marriage but stayed on until the church had found a suitable custodial company to fulfill its needs.

Tools for Schools

Many children in Lawrence County, one of the most economically challenged areas of Ohio, begin the school year without basic school supplies or backpacks.

In 2005, St. Paul Lutheran Church and All Saints began to address this need by creating the Tools for Schools campaign.

In the past five years, the churches have provided approximately 8,800 backpacks filled with school supplies to children in the Ironton area. We are asking you to join us in our annual endeavor to provide supplies to these children.

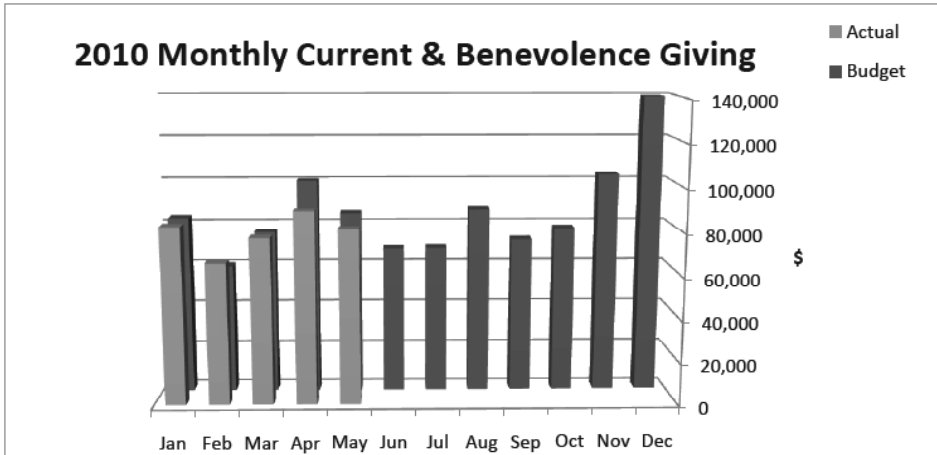
Cabin Fever III yields more than \$1,000 for OSU ministry

Church to host driver safety course

All Saints will host an AARP Driver Safety Class from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 21.

One-time All Saints' pastor dies at age 94

The Rev. James Baldwin, pastor at All Saints Lutheran Church during 1965 to 1969 died Tuesday, June 1 at the age of 94. Pastor Baldwin was the second pastor of All Saints, following Pastor Robert Ensign. He was Pastor Emeritus of First English Lutheran Church, Marysville, where he served from 1971 to 1985. He was predeceased in 1976 by his wife, Carolyn. He is survived by two sons, R. Thomas and C. David, their wives and children.

'God deserves a second chance'

Pasquale (Pat) Ciccone is Italian, through and through. Named after his father, Pat was born July 5, 1936 in the area of Columbus that is now called Italian Village. Before World War II, the area was called Fly Town. St. John the Baptist Italian Catholic Church was (as it still is) the Italian community center. Residents were baptized, confirmed, married and sent to their eternal rest from St. John (the last with the help of Maeder-Quint Tiberi Funeral Home).

Pat has a sister who is eight years older.

Virginia Cardulo, Pat's mother, arrived in the United States at age 3 along with her parents and three siblings. The family settled in New Castle, Pa., where they were farmers.

A meeting in New Castle

Pat's father, Pasquale, arrived at Ellis Island at age 16. His first job was selling popcorn and peanuts as a pushcart vendor on the boardwalk in New Jersey. He later moved to Columbus and started a concrete business. As fate would have it, Pasquale's brother, Sam, settled in New Castle. During one of Pasquale's visits with his brother, Sam introduced him to Virginia and, as Pat says, "the rest is history."

Pat was enrolled in the Columbus Public Schools for his first five years of school. He then transferred to parochial school, graduating from Holy Family High School in 1955. During high school, he played basketball and football.

His mother was a faithful Catholic. One of his friends was black, a fact that didn't bother his mother



in the least. But Pat warned Jerome never to tell his mother what his (Jerome's) father did for a living because Pat knew his mother would never allow him to pal around with the son of a Baptist preacher!

After high school, Pat enlisted in the U.S. Navy. After basic training, he was assigned to sea duty on Adak Island in the Aleutian Island chain off Alaska. He then received orders to report to El Centro Naval Base in the middle of the Mohave Desert. The base, which housed all four branches of the military, had two functions: recovery/testing for parachutes and an aerial gunnery range. Pat was trained as a photographer and was part of a small team that designed and built telescopes, since at that time there was no commercially available equipment that met the Navy's requirements.

Sputnik photos

On Oct. 4, 1957, the Soviet Union launched Sputnik, the world's first artificial satellite. Sputnik created intense interest at El Centro. One night around 2 a.m. (0200 in military time), Pat and his team decided to photograph Sputnik as it flew over the base. They had to be quick, because Sputnik circled

the Earth every 98 minutes. Somehow the Department of the Navy found out about this unofficial effort and quickly took the film and shipped it to Washington, D.C. Although Pat isn't sure the story is true, he and his team were told that this was the first time Sputnik had been photographed by the U.S. government.

Professionally, Pat became involved with mainframe computers in the very early days, 1963. He retired from the State of Ohio as a computer systems manager in 2001.

Pat has been a husband, although not a biological father, more than once. His marriage to his first wife, Terry, lasted 23 years but ended in divorce. After about six months, he joined a singles group where he met Jackie. At first she was a friend and later something more. They were married in 1985 and for 16 years they were incredibly happy. However, after a year of battling cancer, Jackie died in 2002.

Finding a church home

By 1985, Pat had fallen away from his Roman Catholic upbringing. But he decided that "God deserves a second chance." He visited churches of various denominations, but none suited him. Friend Jackie invited him to All Saints. Being Catholic, his first reaction to going to a church founded by that heretic Martin Luther was, "No way!" But, he went to a worship service, liked it, and kept going. Pat says he felt welcomed with open arms. His decision to join came on a Sunday when he and Jackie had to immediately leave worship to go to another function. He explains, "Following Mass at a

Catholic church, the parking lot is like a racetrack. People can't get away fast enough. But, as Jackie and I were leaving All Saints, someone stopped to let me back out of my parking space! I thought, 'Jesus is alive and well and lives here!' I decided to join."

After they were married, Jackie moved into the house in Concord Township (north of Dublin) that Pat and Terry had built. One of the first changes Jackie wanted was a mantle over the fireplace. Pat, who hadn't been encouraged to do woodworking in his first marriage, said he could build one. Jackie was skeptical. Pat said, "I'll build it, and if you don't like it; we'll burn it in the fireplace." The mantle exists to this day. From then on, for each birthday or Christmas, Jackie would ask, "What tool do you want?" With Jackie's encouragement, he built a solid cherry coffee table, an entertainment center, kitchen cupboards, the bed in the master bedroom and many others. He was proudest of the coffee table, and nobody was allowed to touch it.

Remembering Spencer

Pat became stepfather to Jackie's kids. Jackie's son Alan and his wife, Rebecca's, first child was Spencer. Spencer was born with a serious heart defect and had heart surgery when he was 3-days old. He remained intubated for

the first few months, and so he couldn't cry. Pat says that he desperately waited for the day when he could hear Spencer cry. Alan and Rebecca were very protective of Spencer and Grandma Jackie was the only person allowed to baby-sit. One day Pat came home to find Spencer playing with his favorite toy cars – on the cherry coffee table. There were tire grooves on the tabletop. Pat says, "I walked over to Spencer and said, 'Isn't this a neat place to play with your cars? It's just the right height.'" Jackie, watching from the kitchen, quietly said to Pat, "You have arrived." Pat decided that, when Spencer grew up, the two of them would refinish the top of the coffee table. But in 1999, Spencer died at age 3. The grooves have been kept there in Spencer's memory.

Coach Grandpa

Pat says, "Because of Jackie and Spencer, I coach kids. It's the most rewarding thing I've ever done in my life." For the past five years, Pat, better known as Coach Grandpa, has coached baseball and football in Hilliard area leagues. He gets a group of 7- and 8-year-olds and stays with them through age 12.

Last fall, on Oct. 12, Pat married Diane Wood, an active member of All Saints. Diane is a kind and caring person. She is a Stephen Minister (currently on leave) and has cared for her twin 10-year-old

grandsons since they were four months old. This year has been difficult for the family because Diane's daughter-in-law required kidney transplant surgery; she is now doing well and back to work. But, with school out for the summer, Grandma Diane has been busy with two energetic boys. This fall, she will be able to focus on her interests, including participating in the Tuesday and Thursday All Saints Bible study groups.

At All Saints, Pat first sang in the Chancel Choir and now sings in the Jubilate Chorus. He notes, "Pam Spade is a wonderful teacher and director. Most of the choir members don't read music but, with her teaching, it works. And Mary Jane DeArmond is so patient. We have a real team spirit there." Pat was a member of the Witness Committee for four or five years. In addition to woodworking, Pat is a general handyman and both of those skills have also benefited All Saints.

A renewed, changed faith

Relative to his faith, Pat says, "I'm not afraid of God any more. As a Roman Catholic, I was afraid that God would strike me down with lightning. I now feel that God is my friend. I respect God's power, but I'm not afraid of it. I no longer say, 'Jesus was'. Now I say, 'Jesus is'."

All Saints Preschool operates as an outreach program for All Saints Evangelical Lutheran Church. We offer part-time programs for 3-, 4- and 5 year-olds. Our school year begins the week of Sept. 6 and concludes the week of May 23, 2011. We will begin our 20th year this fall with dedicated teachers who are trained in current Early Childhood Education practices.
